PLANNING AND PROGRAMMING IN EMERGENCY SITUATIONS



An emergency situation can be riddled with unforeseen complications. Multiple considerations, perspectives and stakeholders can impact the programming outcome. Equipping oneself with the right skills, knowledge and contextual understanding will ensure recovery projects are sustainable and effective to meet the needs of the affected population.

The objective of the course is to equip learners with the basics in recovery planning and programming in emergency situations. At the end of the course, learners will gain a humanitarian perspective in developing a recovery program.

Capabilities gained are applicable to project management roles across various industries. Learnt skills can assist learners in analysing, preparing, programming, implementing, monitoring and evaluating a recovery program in an emergency or disaster.

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COURSE OUTLINE

ONLINE (2 HOURS)

The Humanitarian World

This online course will cover topics such as history, current trends and challenges faced by the humanitarian sector.

Introduction to Emergencies

This course will share an overview of the different emergencies commonly tackled by aid workers.

Introduction to Planning and Programming

The basic concepts of recovery planning and programming will be covered in this session to ensure the effectiveness and sustainability of humanitarian programmes.



Considerations in Planning and Programming

This session will discuss the programming approach and various considerations including the environment and culture.

Humanitarian Diplomacy

This session looks into developing diplomacy, managing expectations and working with stakeholders in the funding and coordination of recovery programmes.

International Humanitarian Standards

This session introduces the Inter Agency Standing Committee (IASC), Mental Health and Psychosocial Support (MHPSS) and SPHERE guidelines as defined by international humanitarian forums and consortias.

Planning, Programming and Implementation

Upon selecting a recovery scope and after conducting an analysis of the plan, this session looks into various elements, its processes and challenges in planning, programming and implementation. Learners will be introduced to various humanitarian specialisations.

Monitoring and Evaluation

This session will explore steps required for continuous monitoring and evaluation of an ongoing recovery programme to ensure the sustainability of the recovery plan.



The simulation experience will provide learners with an opportunity to participate in a simulated-emergency situation. Learners are encouraged to apply their learnings and skills gained to prepare and mitigate crises.
